Global War on Terror (GWOT) / Regional War on Terror (RWOT)

Summary of Operations

I. <u>Description of Operations Financed</u>: The Air Force is committed to the Global War on Terrorism (GWOT) and will continue to project its many unique capabilities to defeat our enemies anywhere in the world. Maintaining combat readiness is a key factor in supporting the GWOT. We must sustain our critical mission areas of Global Reach, Global Vigilance, and Global Power, while continually maintaining an agile, adaptable, persistent, lethal, and surge-ready air, space and cyberspace force. For the past two decades, the Air Force has taken the fight to hostile forces around the world. We continue our combat contributions through Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF) and Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and the GWOT Program supports forces deployed to the U.S. Central Command's (USCENTCOM's) Area-of-Responsibility (AOR) for Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF).

OEF continues to seek out cells of Al Qaeda and Taliban in remote areas of Afghanistan and lend assistance to coalition partners in countries in the vicinity to rid them of terrorist cells. Funding supports the continued deployment of active duty and reserve personnel to the AOR. This funding also supports post-hostility operations and actions facilitating the transition from war to peace. Program supports forces deployed to the U.S. Central Command's Area-of-Responsibility (AOR) for Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF).

OIF supports U.S. CENTCOM's deployment to the area of operations, and in concert with multinational forces, conducts post-hostility operations and actions facilitating the transition from war to peace. Military activities in the region include overflight rights and access/beddown for deployment of deterrent forces, and protecting Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries from regional air, missile, and Special Operations Forces (SOF) threats to economic and military facilities.

The Air Force is challenged with increased operational costs, global demand for national high-value-low-density air and space systems, and the need for new capabilities that specifically enable the requirements for winning the GWOT. This "Long War" is changing the way we operate. Fiscal constraints, in addition to other challenges translate into risks we must continue to mitigate in order to provide capabilities to the Combatant Commands. The cost of maintaining readiness and actively fighting the GWOT has increased from 2006.

II. Summary Structure: The Air Force's force structure in support of the Global War on Terrorism consists of 19,270 active duty, 2,319 Air Reserve personnel, and 2,559 Air National Guard personnel deployments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom. Of the 24,000 plus deployed, 679 personnel are serving 365-day tours and 5,600 Airmen supporting International Affairs and In Lieu Of (ILO) taskings. The Air Force has more than 200 aircraft of various capabilities deployed in support of OIF and OEF. These aircraft execute daily fighter strikes and sorties, bomber strikes, tanker and cargo sorties in support of OIF and OEF using a variety of different weapon systems from F-16 Fighters to B-1B Bombers.

I. <u>Description of Operations Financed</u>:

As a force provider to U.S. Central Command's (USCENTCOM's) Area-of-Responsibility (AOR) for Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF), the primary Combat Forces are the Air Force's front-line fighters and bombers (A/OA-10, B-1, B-2, B-52, F-15 and F-16) representing the "tip of the global power projection spear." These assets provide a strong capability to counter a wide range of threats to the U.S. and its allies, as well as help assure a viable deterrent posture in the region.

Program funding provides for the continued deployment of active duty and reserve personnel to the AOR. This combat program also supports USCENTCOM's deployment to the area of operations and, in concert with multinational forces, post-hostility operations and actions facilitating the transition from war to post-war. This critical program also provides for the force deployment, sustainment and equipping of flying operations for tasked personnel and assets. Global War on Terrorism (GWOT) support encompasses personnel travel and transportation, supplies and equipment, Contract Logistics Support and flying hour support directly related to the warfighting assets aligned under this subactivity group.

b. Narrative Justification: The Combat Air Force (CAF) GWOT flying hour requirements continues to project the United States combat capability at USCENTCOM's AOR in support of OIF and OEF. Supports incremental OIF/OEF fighter, bomber, and helicopter hours of approximately 95,000 beyond the FY07 President's Budget. Flying missions include Close Air Support (CAS); air interdiction; reconnaissance (finding, tracking and targeting high-value targets); and surveillance sorties to monitor insurgent troop movements. Requirements provide aircraft spares, aircraft consumables and fuel. Maintaining aerial combat-ready forces for the rapid deployment to the AOR is the CSAF's top priority in waging a fulldomain flying operation in the prosecution of the Global War on Terror.

Amended Narrative Justification: Decreased fuel cost based on anticipated repricing.

Table below shows CAF FY07 requested incremental hours. GWOT flying hours are an Air Force mission critical requirement and failure to fund the incremental hours jeopardizes Air Force's participation in the GWOT, diminishing the aerial strike capability for combat forces in the AOR. Funding requirement includes the Peacetime Training Congressional transfer of \$400,000 to Title IX.

- OPTEMPO also includes baseline fuel rate increase shortfall of \$258,392K due to the recalculation of fuel rate above the FY07 PB rate of \$84 per barrel, per OSD guidance. Requirement covers Total Force (Active, Guard and Reserve). Shortfall represents approximately 16 days of flying 228 aircraft. Failure to fund the aviation and ground fuel requirements results in the Air Force's inability to fly USCENTCOM's OIF/OEF tasked combat operations in the AOR.

- c. <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Continuous on-going mobilization of aircraft forces in and out of the AOR accelerates the need for operational maintenance provided by CLS to maintain deployed aircraft at full operational capability. Additionally, as the combat GWOT flying hours increase, so does the maintenance required on the aircraft. Supports bomber and fighter weapon systems (e.g., B-1, F-15 and F-16). The harsh desert environment and conditions of the combat operations cause significantly more damage and corrosion to weapon systems than the usual peacetime, training activities.
- FY07 funding increase is due to CLS reconstitution input, which covers the long-term aircraft and engine degradation due to aging, wear and tear and combat loss experienced during the Air Force's participation in contingency combat operations for over 15 years to include OIF and OEF. Other examples include extensive sand damage, excessive structural damage beyond intermediate repair and corrosion due to the harsh environment. Requirements include contractor material and personnel support for depot and operational maintenance, sustaining engineering and technical services. Failure to fund CLS prolongs the inability to ensure timely repair of damaged aircraft and returned to full operational capability to support future on-going combat missions.

I. Description of Operations Financed:

Primary Combat Weapons supports the refurbishment/reconstitution of the bomber force's air launched missiles due to the increased Operations Tempo (OPTEMPO) as a direct result of the Global War on Terror (GWOT). Combat weapons readiness supported include the Air Launched Cruise Missile (ALCM), Advanced Cruise Missile (ACM), Advanced Medium-Range Air-to-Air Missile (AMRAAM), and Air Intercept Missile (AIM) missiles.

Specific efforts support maintenance via Contractor Logistics Support (CLS) due to the extensive equipment corrosion and damage caused by the harsh operating environment of the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR) for Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF). CLS provides contractor material and personnel support for depot and operational maintenance, sustaining engineering and technical services. Also included are travel requirements for Security Force members which provide essential security for missiles.

- **a.** <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Funds temporary duty (TDY), deployment gear (uniforms, boots and related gear), medical services, supplies, equipment, and other personnel support costs supporting deploying Security Forces members. Failure to fund this critical TDY, equipment and services will place the health and safety of our front-line security forces at risk.

- **b.** <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Funding provides Contractor Logistics Support (CLS), contractor material and personnel support for depot and operational maintenance, sustaining engineering and technical services. This funding requirement is the result of increased OPTEMPO, extensive equipment corrosion and damage caused by the harsh operating environment of our aircraft.
 - Given the increased OPTEMPO associated with GWOT, logistical support is necessary to service assets. The Advanced Medium-Range Airto-Air Missile (AMRAAM) is a new generation air-to-air guided missile, employing active radar targeting tracking. The AMRAAM is compatible with the Air Force F-15 and F-16 aircraft. Due to post 9-11 fighter sorties, the AMRAAM missile flight hours have increased 68%, nearly doubling the wear and tear rate attributed to the harsh conditions at United States Central Command's (USCENTCOM's) AOR. If not funded, AMRAAM inventory will not meet mission capability operation requirement, thus severely degrading the aerial combat capabilities of delivering high precision weaponry to destroy high value targets in a variety of settings at the AOR. Hot aging was identified as a contributing factor to the AMRAAM Aerojet Rocket Motor deficiency. Testing by Raytheon showed that prolonged exposure to high temperatures causes measurable shrinkage in blast tube phenolic insulator. This leaves fully mission capable availability levels at an all time low. Meanwhile, hundreds of assets are rapidly being pulled from the inventory and coded as unserviceable. The AMRAAM Service Life Prediction Program identified an aging issue leading to a potential safety of flight concern with 1992-1994 Aerojet rocket motors. AMRAAM missiles stored and used in GWOT locations have been subjected to severe temperatures. A sampling of these missiles was used in a static firing test that resulted in a rocket motor blast tube failure. The risk of a catastrophic blast tube failure with continued exposure to severe temperatures led Raytheon to issue a recommendation to remove all 1992-1994 Aerojet rocket motors from service.

Supports the refurbishment/reconstitution and deployment of the COMPASS CALL (EC-130H), which provides electronic warfare capability. Additionally, supports the Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (ISR) capabilities via the MQ-9 Predator employed to enhance the effectiveness of other operational weapons systems in direct support of the Global War on Terror (GWOT).

Specific efforts support maintenance via Contractor Logistics Support (CLS) of the MQ-9 Predator Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV).

Specific efforts support combat forces and intelligence activities through the collection and assessments of huge volumes of regional media designed to influence key audiences including the populace governments and terrorists.

 - **a.** <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Funds temporary duty, deployment gear (uniforms, boots and related gear), medical services, supplies, equipment and other personnel support costs. These costs are based on projected mobilization requirements of active duty, Air National Guard (ANG) and Air Force Reserve (AFR) personnel to the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR) in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF).
 - Funding provides support for the newly developed pre-deployment training that begins in FY07. Training includes the required Air Force Special Operations Command Advanced Skills Training, which employs a "warrior-training-warrior" philosophy, teaching the skills necessary for the deployed forces within the AOR. The training also includes advanced communication, navigation, airborne operations, night operation, tactical meteorology and oceanography tactics, techniques and procedures (TTP) and small unit maneuver. With training complete and deployment to the USCENTCOM's AOR, these combat weathermen are meteorologists capable to operate in hostile or denied territory. They gather and interpret weather data and provide localized weather intelligence, generate accurate and mission-tailored target and route forecasts and communicate weather observations to the deployed joint forces in Iraq, supporting OIF and OEF operational missions.
 - Also provides travel and subsistence for representatives of 32 developing coalition countries who have partnered with the United States in efforts to fight terrorism. Coalition participation is essential for an overall strategic plan in providing support of a coalition based plan and coordination of GWOT operations made possible by USCENTCOM through their Coalition Planning Group. If not funded, the Combatant Commands will not be able to fully exploit the expertise of those developing nations, critical to the success of GWOT planning.

 - **b.** Narrative Justification: Funds requirements for deployment and sustainment directly supporting the deployment/mobilization of active duty, Air National Guard (ANG) and Air Force Reserve (AFR) personnel supporting the Global War on Terrorism. Operations Tempo (OPTEMPO) includes flying hour support. This requirement includes force deployment, sustainment and equipping of flying operations for tasked personnel and assets.

Aircraft used in OIF and OEF will require a more intensive aircraft and/or engine overhaul than the typical maintenance program. The harsh desert environment and conditions of the combat operations cause significantly more damage and corrosion to weapon systems than the usual peacetime, training activities.

• CLS requirement is the result of increased OPTEMPO, extensive equipment corrosion and damage caused by the harsh operating environment of our aircraft. Supports Airborne Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR) systems such as the MQ-9 Predator UAV, Global Hawk and U-2. Requirements include contractor material and personnel support for depot and operational maintenance, sustaining engineering and technical services. Failure to fund jeopardizes the restoration of the Airborne ISR mission-capable status, degrading the long-term readiness level and the Air Force's inability to provide critical intel gathering, force protection and surveillance/reconnaissance support to OIF/OEF combat operations.

I. Description of Operations Financed:

Air Operations Training consists of pre-wartime deployment fighter lead-in training, combat training and advanced tactical training for fighter pilots. Training is specifically geared towards current wartime scenarios aircrew will experience when flying over Iraq and Afghanistan.

Specific efforts support maintenance via contract support of training and aggressor squadron aircraft; training range activities, facilities and equipment; combat simulation training; dissimilar air combat training; ground training munitions and training deployments and exercises.

Additional GWOT-specific efforts support aviation units through aircrew proficiency landing training for combat operations, mitigating risks associated with mishaps involving Unimproved Landing Zones, such as unpaved airfields, as often encountered in the Operation ENDURING FREEDOM wartime environment.

 - a. <u>Narrative Justification</u>: This program provides funds for the contract services of deployment training and readiness exercises in support of OIF and OEF. Training courses and scenarios are being revamped to include the mission profile of the dessert environment within the AOR. Over 12,000 personnel will flow through training in FY 2007. This program supports costs such as contracted instructors, along with supplies, temporary duty (TDY), equipment, and any other cost for services provided. Contracted instructors provide Air Support Operations Center (ASOC) training, Air Warfare Center (AWC) support for joint, international and United States exercises, and management of the ranges that support the various exercises.
 - The increase in combat training is due to in training and exercises to prepare personnel for deployments. Flag Exercises today no longer have the same mission objectives as those from past eras. In today's fight each exercise is uniquely tailored to specific mission conditions deploying forces will encounter upon arrival at their deployed location, thus driving incremental direct Global War on Terrorism (GWOT) costs. This training is the only venue Air Expeditionary Force (AEF) units have for composite and joint training for integration prior to OEF/OIF combat operations. The rentals of Advanced Threats (threat emitters, training targets) provide the high fidelity simulation of real world threats these units will face in theater before they deploy for GWOT combat operations.
 - The Gulf Air Warfare Center (GAWC) in the United Arab Emirates is still in its growing stages. GAWC funding will cover the increase to costs for training, exercises, academics (Strike, Command & Control, Intelligence, and Combat Search and Rescue) for US and allied countries to better understand the terrain and environment in the Middle East region. Participants will be better prepared to fight the Global War on Terror as they are training in that environment. It also fulfills a full time strategic partnering/engagement plan in the U.S. Central Command area-of-responsibility. This U.S. Central Command Air Forces requirement will strengthen the cooperation and interoperability of various countries within the Gulf region and other US allies in direct support of OIF and OEF operations.

Combat theater air control/intelligence systems and air control operations include: deployable forward air control centers, Theater Battle Management, special reconnaissance systems, Air and Space Operations Centers (AOCs), ground theater air control systems and airborne command and control systems, as well as a center for managing Command and Control/Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance requirements. Aircraft continuously deployed in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF)/Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF) encounter extreme operational demands in harsh environments at the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR), thus accelerating the need for depot level repairs to maintain operational capability. Depot Purchased Equipment Maintenance (DPEM) encompasses requirements for organic, contract and inter-service depot level maintenance purchased from the Depot Maintenance Activity Group (DMAG). The DPEM program purchases depot maintenance for aircraft, missiles, engines, software, Other Major End Items (OMEI), exchangeables, area base manufacture and storage for Air Force weapon systems and subsystems.

In this Subactivity Group, DPEM supports the specific efforts of mission readiness for the Air Force's front line operating weapon systems. These assets, which provide the United States with a viable deterrent posture, include fighter and bomber aircraft such as the F-15, F-16, A-10, B-1, B-2 and B-52; and conventional missiles in support of the Global War on Terror (GWOT). The DPEM requirements also include fleet-wide refurbishment of the fighter and bomber aircraft associated with this sub-activity group as a direct result of GWOT.

Air Force depot capacity is sufficient to absorb an increase in DPEM workload requirements associated with GWOT and our industry partners have capacity to add workload. Currently, the depots have sufficient manpower to handle a temporary increase in workload. As additional manpower is needed, the Air Logistic Centers will first use employee overtime. Second, internal manpower realignments may be implemented to efficiently utilize existing manpower. Finally, manpower requirements may be temporarily increased by the use of contract augmentees and government term employees.

 - **b** <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Continuous on-going mobilization of aircraft forces in and out of the AOR in support of OIF/OEF accelerates the need for depot level repairs to maintain aircraft at full operational capabilities. For example, engine overhaul requirements are tied to the hours flown; thus, an increase in hours results in an incremental increase in engine overhaul requirements. Further, aircraft used in OIF and OEF will require a more intensive aircraft and/or engine overhaul than the typical maintenance program. The harsh desert environment and conditions of the combat operations cause significantly more damage and corrosion to weapon systems than the usual peacetime, training activities.
 - The flying operations DPEM requirements cover 1 B-1B aircraft PDM; A-10 and helicopter depot inspections; and approximately 10 depot engine overhauls for engines supporting the F-16 and helicopters. The Air Force continues to develop a mix of agile and flexible capabilities to maximize readiness. Failure to fund jeopardizes the restoration of the weapon systems and supported platforms mission-capable status, degrading the long-term readiness level and the Air Force's ability to respond to USCENTCOM's OIF/OEF requirements. \$195,025 of this requirement consists of reconstitution of long-term aircraft and engine degradation due to aging, wear and tear and combat loss experienced during the Air Force's continuous participation in contingency operations to include OIF and OEF. Other examples include extensive sand damage, excessive structural damage beyond intermediate repair and corrosion due the harsh environmental conditions. DPEM will continue to be an area requiring additional funding as the Air Force continues its focus on aircraft and equipment reconstitution efforts while participating in extended ongoing contingency operations. DPEM requirements include fleet-wide requirements cover approximately 7 aircraft PDMs which includes the B-52 and F-15 aircraft and approximately depot engine overhauls for such engines supporting the B-52, B-1B and helicopters. The Air Force continues to develop a mix of agile and flexible capabilities to mitigate uncertainty and maximize readiness.

- a. Narrative Justification: The critical FSRM program supports twelve wartime, primary Area of Responsibility (AOR) sites through demolition, sustainment, restoration and modernization projects. This objective is achieved through a wide variety of infrastructure repair, and minor construction projects. Projects of this nature include simple facility repair such as repairing a leaking roof or a faulty water line to much more complex projects such as the design and construction of taxiways, helicopter landing pads, and road construction and repair. Further examples of repair and minor construction projects supported would include airfield lighting and navigation aids, power production facilities, aircraft parking, fuel delivery systems, fire protection systems and security fencing. Additional repair projects such as those related to safety issues, emergency repair, and quality of life are also supported in this area. Another critical facet of this program are Contingency Construction Authority (CCA) projects that exceed the normal \$750K minor construction threshold that would generally categorize a construction project as Military Construction (MILCON). The authority for CCA construction projects is contained in the language of Title 10, United States Code (USC), Section 2808. Specific provisions of this legislation permit, following authorization from the Office of the Secretary of Defense and congressional notification, construction of projects exceeding \$750K assuming they are of a temporary nature and not intended for long term use/occupancy by U.S. Armed Forces up to an annual threshold of \$100M.
- Decrease from FY06 to FY07 is driven by the funding of seven CCA projects valued at \$99M in September 2006.

I. Description of Operations Financed:

This program provides funding for essential forward deployed wartime base support functions, engineering and environmental programs in support of the Global War on Terror (GWOT). The program sustains mission capability, quality of life, workforce productivity and infrastructure support at contingency locations.

The Base Support program provides for both in-house and contractual support for critical mission readiness at 11 installations where the Air Force is the lead component within the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR). Base Support activities include the following major mission support programs: 1) security forces; 2) airfield and air operations support; 3) support staffs, to include personnel, comptroller, chaplain, judge advocate, public affairs, plans and programs and administration; 4) logistics, to include procurement, transportation services, personal property management, equipment maintenance and retail supply services; 5) services, to include food services, fitness centers and recreation services; and 6) emergency services, to include fire protection, aircraft crash rescue, emergency management and explosive ordnance disposal. Each of these programs provide for wartime readiness gear, personal protective gear (Individual Body Armor/Advanced Combat Efforts), equipment/vehicle maintenance, equipment and supplies, data processing, furnishing management and base materiel support. Funding of these critical activities ensures installations can fully support Joint Forces prosecuting wartime operations in support of the GWOT mission.

This program also supports Facilities Operations, providing the engineering operations, engineering services and real property management required to accomplish such installation support activities as grounds maintenance, insect control and utilities. In addition, this program includes Communications activities, which provides essential operational and sustainment support for the AOR network, to include the network control center, information assurance security (firewalls, passwords, etc.), telephone switches and local/long-distance toll charges, the base fiber and copper cable infrastructure (towers, repeaters and base stations), internal building communications wiring and routing equipment.

Special Interest Item: Funding will provide enough IBA units to equip each rotation, bringing the protection into compliance with the Service Members Safety Act of 2006. Level IV protection provides increased armor protection and side armor protection plates. Replacement rate has not been determined and remains contingent on the wear rate of the latest models.

- **a.** <u>Narrative Justification:</u> Funds incremental pay and allowances of DoD civilians hired directly to support contingency operations in either a participatory or support role. These funds support civilian premium pay and civilian temporary hires associated with GWOT operations.
- Funds temporary home station civilian over hires to provide critical continuity of operations during the period of military member's deployments. Examples of critical areas supported include first responders such as firefighters, security forces, explosive ordnance disposal and service related backfills for dining hall personnel. b. Narrative Justification: Funds costs of (1) temporary duty and transportation related to contingency deployment; (2) deployment gear (e.g., uniforms and boots for the AOR); (3) Individual Body Armor (IBA); (4) medical services; (5) retaining service members at contingency locations longer than programmed; (6) safeguarding members' household goods and vehicles while deployed; and (7) transition assistance for service members and support programs for deployed members' families; and morale, welfare and recreation activities for deployed members. Failure to fund these requirements will put the safety and well-being of our troops and their families at risk.

FY07 funding increase is driven in two critical areas, IBA and medical support.

- Replacement of obsolete/unserviceable IBA is critical to the survival of deployed Air Force members specifically in a time of a significant increase in insurgent sniper activity. Total IBA replacement includes side armor and neck protection plates. Vests and protective plates come in different sizes, so stock levels are higher than the number of service members in order to accommodate each individual. IBA consists of the Outer Tactical Vest (OTV) combined with 2 rifle plates called Enhanced Small Arms Protective Inserts (ESAPI) and Deltoid Auxiliary Protection System (DAPS), which provides Level IV+ protection (Level IV protection provides armor-piercing round and additional shoulder protection). Level IV Body Armor protection is the minimum protective level for all contingency operations. It is worn to stop small arm and shrapnel wounds to upper body areas. These funds will also provide Advanced Combat Helmet (ACH) for aircrew and ground support personnel. Effective June 2006, the ACH replaces the Personal Armor Support Ground Troup (PASGT) (Kevlar helmet) because it outperforms the PASGT in survivability, injury avoidance, capability and head supported mass by providing ballistic and impact protection, increased 9mm bullet protection and improved field of vision and localization. If funds are not received, the mission and personal safety issues increase considerably, to include unacceptable risk or serious injury and loss of life.
- Medical support costs are driven by two key factors, the Air Forces assuming control of the Balad Iraq field hospital in FY06 and the Bagram Afghanistan field hospital in FY07 from the Army. Since the stand up of the Balad facility in 2003 the entire hospital infrastructure has been enclosed in tents including critical surgical facilities. In FY07 the Air Force will move the hospital into a newly constructed hardened facility incurring significant costs to outfit. The new facility will require complete outfitting of top of the line surgical suites, bedding, x-ray equipment, laboratory equipments, and furnishings/office supplies. Current furnishing cannot be configured to the new facility. The Air Force will also incur significant costs for the Bagram Hospital beginning in FY 07 for the day-to-day operations of this facility. Although unlike the Balad facility

- **c.** Narrative Justification: Operating support encompasses sustainment of AOR sites the Air Force has Base Operating Support (BOS) control over. BOS covers basically all functions of a stateside base in a forward deployed location to include facility/infrastructure sustainment, security, communications, supply, air traffic control, contractor support, troop housing, food services, fuel depots, vehicle maintenance and services related MWR activities. Failure to fund these base support activities will result in a deterioration of our forward base infrastructure and support that is critical to housing and maintaining deployed troops and weapons system.
- Beginning in January 2007 the Air Force will begin a series of classified mission realignments along with planned increased mission initiatives relating to recent political decisions, all with significant dollars cost tails. Classified information is available upon request.
- Following the onset of operations in southwest and south central Asia, office, housing and workspace structures have been slowly migrating from tents and trailers to hardened facilities. FY2007 sees an increase of approximately 575,591 square feet of newly constructed facilities being completed, which require complete outfitting to become fully functional players in the fight. These facilities require communication equipment installation, office/billeting furnishings, office/backshop supplies, etc. Although personnel strength varies based on mission needs and rotation schedules, at any given time these facilities support an average of 21,000 Air Force members.
- Support equipment replacement and contract service increases to include ground fuel, laundry services, installation utilities, and food preparation.
- Power production support increases from FY 2006 as AOR sites transfer from generator supported facilities to centralized power production systems. Site power production systems are contract supported versus in house supported generators of the past.
- Costs relating to Air Traffic control and landing system commercialization in Iraq and Afghanistan are increasing significantly in FY 2007. In FY 2007 air traffic control sectors are migrating from blue suit control to contract supported.
- Communication infrastructure upgrades and commercialization costs are also increasing as circa 2001 systems are replaced/upgraded. Affected systems include switchboards, DSN service, circuit upgrades and servers.

Strategic Offensive C3I and Computer (C4I) assets comprise the media through which interconnected airborne and ground-based command centers execute commands for offensive strikes against opposing threats. This capability relies on systems that are fast, accurate, reliable, secure and resistant to destruction and disruption and tailored to the needs of the National Command Authority, United States Strategic Command and operational commanders.

Tactical Satellite Communications (AN/PRC-117 radio system) for cruise missile support operations provide real time collaboration and dynamic mission planning capabilities to Combatant Commanders for prosecution of time sensitive targets in direct support of the Global War on Terror (GWOT). Additionally, the satellite adds critical operational capabilities to employment of the Tomahawk Land Attack Missile (TLAM) by providing communications needed for real world direct TLAM targeting. With tactical satellite communications, recent improvements provide enhanced capability as a strike weapon in support of emergent OEF targets, such as the terrorist cells of Al Qaeda and Taliban in remote areas of Afghanistan.

- c. <u>Narrative Justification</u>: This program provides for services and other miscellaneous contract support directly supporting the warfighters in the fight on the Global War on Terror.
 - Funding increase continues to support critical C3 type contracts for data processing of information to the warfighters. Space Command is the lead Command for providing support contracts that provide data dissemination and processing through the Global Broadcast Services (GBS) Systems. GBS is a system of information sources, uplink sites, broadcast satellites, receiver terminals, as well as management processes for requesting and coordinating the distribution of information products. GBS pushes a high volume of intelligence, weather and C2 type information in order to make critical decisions for mission objectives. One example is the data feed of Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Video (UAVV). Combatant Commanders rely on UAVV feeds for reviewing/analyzing the AOR in accomplishing mission objectives. Over the next FY, the support for GBS information products capacity is expected to increase by 40%. If no funds are provided, critical information from various system sources will be jeopardized and the warfighters will not have the intelligence reports, video streams and imagery reports that directly support OIF and OEF requirements.

- 4. 3.5.4 Contractor Logistics Support
 - **d.** Narrative Justification: Contractor Logistics Support (CLS) is the critical workforce ensuring 24 hours, 7 days a week operational availability in support of OIF/OEF intelligence and satellite missions. CLS provides contractor material and personnel support for depot and operational maintenance, sustaining engineering and technical services. This funding requirement is the result of the increased OPTEMPO, extensive equipment corrosion and damage caused by the harsh operating environment of the Air Force weapon systems.
 - FY 2006 actual was a one-time CLS requirement from Space Command for the Military Strategic and Tactical Relay/Defense Satellite Communications System (MILSTAR/DSCS) and the GBS Systems. MILSTAR/DSCS satellite systems provide C3 and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance for the President, Secretary of Defense, NATO, Allied nations, Unit Control Centers, and other government agencies in support of OIF. MILSTAR provides secure survivable communications for US forces deployed to the Middle East-99.5% dependability in FY04 and FY05. The GBS provides worldside, high capacity, one-way transmission of digitized imagery, operational orders, video, maps, logistics, weather data, etc. GBS is a critical 24/7 data source supporting OEF/OIF. - **e. Narrative <u>Justification</u>:** Continuous on-going mobilization of aircraft forces in and out of the AOR accelerates the need for operational maintenance provided by CLS to maintain deployed aircraft at full operational capability. Supports C-17 and KC-10. Included is CLS associated with the GWOT over-fly hours (approximately 11,600) for KC-10, C-21 and C-40 in support of GWOT contingencies. The harsh desert environment and conditions of the combat operations cause significantly more damage and corrosion to weapon systems than the usual peacetime, training activities.

The Air Force operates on an Air Expeditionary Force (AEF) rotation cycle which accounts for the movement of personnel on the average every 120 days. EACN provides these senior leaders with required on-board broadband capability enabling situational awareness and command, control and communication (C3) in a network-centric warfare environment via direct contact with battlefield commanders in the AOR. This also provides battlefield commanders with the capability to communicate with senior leaders while aboard OSA/VIP/SAM aircraft regarding emerging GWOT threats within the AOR. If funding is not received, the Air Force will struggle to meet its mission to operate and maintain the C3 systems/networks for the executive aircraft fleet. C3 at peak capability is crucial at a time when negotiations and face-to-face dialogue between senior U.S and foreign leaders are vital to the stabilization and future of Iraq and Afghanistan.

Aircraft continuously deployed in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF)/Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF) encounter extreme operational demands in harsh environments at the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR), thus accelerating the need for depot level repairs to maintain operational capability. Depot Purchased Equipment Maintenance (DPEM) encompasses requirements for organic, contract and inter-service depot level maintenance purchased from the Depot Maintenance Activity Group (DMAG). The DPEM program purchases depot maintenance for aircraft, missiles, engines, software, Other Major End Items (OMEI), exchangeables, area base manufacture and storage for Air Force weapon systems and subsystems.

In this Subactivity Group, DPEM supports the readiness of the Air Force's mobilization, deployment, airlift and air refueling forces. These assets include the C-5, C-130, and KC-135 aircraft, and provide the United States with the capability of meeting the nation's mobility needs in support of the Global War on Terror (GWOT). The DPEM requirements also include fleet-wide refurbishment of the fighter and bomber aircraft associated with this sub-activity group as a direct result of GWOT.

- **b.** Narrative Justification: As GWOT moves into its fourth year, the Air Force has experienced a steady flow of operating support requirements. Specifically, this program funds repair of war-related items such as pallets/nets, as well as Readiness Spares (RSP) kits for warfighters AF-wide. Also within this program are funded Command, Control, Communications and Computers (C4I) requirements requisite to effective operations in cyberspace.
 - In FY 2007, Operating Support needs are broadly consistent with FY 2006. Funding supports RSP kits and pallets and nets. Also included are numerous C4I wartime needs, including Defense Information System Agency efforts to combat electronic intrusion attacks, COMSEC staffing, secure communications, and network operations support centers. RSP kits include consumable items such as pod spare parts, actuators, circuit cards, aircraft oils, hydraulic fluids, tires, wheels, steel banding, etc. that will support initial operations through the first 30 days of a deployment. It will also include parts to fix or replace the gun/gun barrel and parts to repair support equipment. The replacement of pallets and nets is critical to maintain the amount of cargo airlifted to and from the AOR. Nets are required to stabilize airlift cargo on the pallets, and are being used at a rate of 12,000 per month. The nets are the only AF certified means of securing airlift cargo on USAF aircraft. Pallets are the only items available to use to move cargo on USAF airlift missions. Without adequate funding for RSP kits and communication equipment that make it to and from the fight on pallets and nets, aircraft availability to the Combatant Commander will be degraded.
 - Readiness Spare kits (RSP) kits are platform specific (meaning they differ from airframe to airframe). Kits provide key spares for aircraft during deployment periods. As units transition to and from the AOR, their RSP are sent forward with unit equipment to operate for a short periods of time. Examples of RSP kit items include: circuit cards, black boxes and consumables (gaskets, nuts, bolts,). Equipment is transported in large containers that have faced wear and tear over the years traveling to and from the GWOT. Without funding, aircraft could become non-mission capable due to not having parts and tools on-hand to quickly recover minor aircraft repairs. Funding ensures high levels of aircraft availability for the Combatant Commander.
 - In FY 2006 there were multiple one-time purchases and expenses. Examples include the following: Corrosion surveys were conducted in FY 2006 to evaluate the state of Air Force equipment in the AOR. Investigations were conducted to screen commonly used decontaminants

by evaluating their corrosive effect on the static properties of structural metallic materials. Additionally, FY 2006 funds were provided to replace materials that had degraded in multiple contingency locations, as the harsh deployment environment led to major equipment repairs.

Base Support activities include programs that provide for wartime readiness gear, personal protective gear, equipment/vehicle maintenance and equipment and supplies. Funding of these critical activities, supplies and equipment ensures installations can fully support deployed Air Force personnel prosecuting wartime operations in support of the GWOT mission.

- a. Narrative Justification: Funding is required to ensure warfighters are adequately equipped and trained to support contingency operation deployments. Supplies and equipment items include mobility/chemical warfare gear to support the warfighter and bags, pallet jacks and pallet containers. These assets are used by personnel deploying to the Area-of-Responsibility (AOR). Lack of funding will result in service members not being prepared to fight and win the GWOT.
- The decrease is due to a one-time contract to purchase 361,905 Individual First Aid kits for a total modernization of the First Responder First Aid Kits. These kits are used by members to assist in rendering self-aid, buddy care, care for minor injuries, trauma, assist in rendering CPR and splint wounds. Each kit is vacuum sealed in a waterproof/chemical resistant package which extends the First Aid Kit shelf life by 3 to 5+ years. The overall objective is to ensure USAF warfighter are provided the most effective medical care during the initial response phase in a battlefield environment. The kits provide warfighters the initial medical care which could save them from serious infection, permanent disability and possibly loss of life.
- Funds support mobility gear and readiness equipment for personnel to include chemical and biological protection.

I. Description of Operations Financed:

This program includes a series of disciplines conducted by the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (AFOSI). The nature of AFOSI's many disciplines provide critical support to the Air Force at locations throughout the world. AFOSI is a Field Operating Agency under the direction and guidance of the Air Force Inspector General (SAF/IG). It functions as a federal law enforcement agency with responsibility for conducting criminal investigations, counterintelligence activities, and force protection support for the Air Force.

AFOSI plays an active role in the Global War on Terror by providing top-notch investigative support and valuable intelligence information to the combatant and Service component commanders. AFOSI, with its headquarters at Andrews AFB, MD, conducts specialized investigative support in such disciplines as forensics, behavioral sciences, and hypnosis. AFOSI agents are deployed around the world, in multiple AORs, and they actively participate in world-wide joint terrorism task forces, sharing and acting on information, relying on the unique skills and investigative specialties of the participating organizations to ensure no potential threat goes unchecked. As the executive agency for the Air Force Psychophysiological Detection of Deception (Polygraph) and technical surveillance countermeasures programs, it offers a wide variety of services to a diverse customer base. AFOSI also plays a key role in computer intrusion investigations and DoD counterdrug programs.

- a. <u>Narrative Justification:</u> This program funds temporary duty, deployment gear (uniforms, boots, and related gear), medical services, supplies, equipment, and other personnel support costs. These costs are based on projected mobilization requirements of active duty, Air National Guard (ANG) and Air Force Reserve (AFR) personnel to the Area-of-Responsibility in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF) and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF).
- Funding supports Counterintelligence and Force Protection providing the Commander of CENTCOM with the ability to directly analyze the threat of foreign intelligence collection against US and coalition forces. Additionally, funds the Defense Computer Forensic Laboratory to support large-scale GWOT investigations. Without funding, the Air Force will be unable to directly collect or analyze threats of foreign intelligence collection against US and coalition forces, which will directly impact a command's ability to make effective war-fighting decisions or take proactive measures.
- Funding supports the travel, transportation and equipment for members' deployments. The personnel deploying are highly trained in the following areas: psychophysiological detection of deception (polygraph) and technical surveillance countermeasures. Without funding members would not receive the proper equipment and supplies to meet the challenges in the AOR ultimately hampering the mission and possible loss of life. The Air Force operates on Air Expeditionary Force rotation cycles and deploys members for an average of 120 days.

 - b. Narrative Justification: This program funds requirements for deployment and sustainment activities directly supporting the deployment/mobilization of active duty, Air National Guard (ANG), Air Force Reserve (AFR) personnel supporting the Global War on Terror. Funding supports other services and contracts in association with investigative support, psycho physiological detection and deception and surveillance countermeasures.
 - Funding request supports the Headquarters Air Force Office of Special Investigation (AFOSI) in major categories such as deployable forensic platforms, surge training, counterintelligence analysis, deployable gear, security and investigative activity surveillance, and deployable communications. Without funding, special agents will be unable to provide Commanders reliable/timely data for command judgment/decisions on critical intelligence/criminal efforts. Terrorists and criminals become unchallenged, leading to catastrophic failure and/or loss of life. Without funding, AFOSI will substantially reduce Personnel Security Investigations (PSI), threat reduction investigations, criminal death cases and fraud support world-wide in support of the Global War on Terror.
 - Funding increase is due to classified program details provided under higher classification.

 - **a.** <u>Narrative Justification</u>: Funds support activities at the Coalition Liaison Center (formerly known as the Coalition Village). In addition, funding support the deployment and sustainment of C4I directly supporting active duty, Air National Guard (ANG), Air Force Reserve (AFR) personnel serving in the Central Command area of operations (AOR) to include the Horn of Africa.
 - These are model driven outputs for the people and assets operating in the AOR as identified in the Operation Plan (OPlan) and Time Phased Force Deployment Data (TPFDD). Funding supports subject matter expert linguists under the Joint Rapid Acquisition Cell (JRAC), Bilingual, Bicultural Advisory Program. The JRAC is a process to facilitate Joint Urgent Operational Needs (JUONs). This program assisted the Combatant Commander to meet warfighting needs when time constraints make the typical acquisition process non-responsive. It focuses on needs that, if unfilled, could result in the loss of life, injury, or the failure of a mission. This program will be executed under the Army by the Multi-national Force-Iraq (MNF-I). This funding also supports activities at the Coalition Liaison Center. Of the 64 Coalition Nations with liaison officers currently at Headquarters Central Command, 31 are receiving assistance under USC Title 10, Chapter 53, Sec 1051a. Without continued support, the US would risk losing representation from these nations as part of the coalition in the GWOT.
 - Additionally these funds support Foreign Media Analysis (FMA) and Counterintelligence and Force Protection. FMA has expanded
 from print media only to analysis of all media; and counterintelligence and force protection analyzes the threat of foreign intelligence
 collection against US and coalition forces.
